TC Enters Next Phase of Contested WWTP Permit Process Board Approves Additional Funds

Travis Country recently finished the discovery phase of their contested permit case against Stratus Properties, Inc. The discovery phase involved providing responses to 80 questions from Stratus attorneys. This information included water quality tests, public information, emails, etc. In turn, Stratus was also required to produce design details and other information. This will be shared and analyzed by a toxicologist, a waste water treatment plant (WWTP) expert and engineers hired by TC.

A TC subcommittee has been working with Association attorneys to contest the permit application for a WWTP, which will service Municipal Utility District (MUD) #4. The MUD covers a wide area beginning adjacent to Travis Country and continuing out SW Parkway and down to the city-owned Barton Creek greenbelt. An unknown mixture of retail, homes, apartments, and a golf course are possible projects that could be built after the permit has been approved by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). According to the permit filed, the WWTP is expected to spray 600,000 gallons of effluent per day over 220 acres

across from Foster Ranch Road.

Other Austin neighborhoods, such as Lake Pointe, have experienced sewage spills and other problems (see www.lakepointehoa.org/newsletters) with WWTPs. TCCSA's goal is to ensure that we have pursued every avenue in the TCEQ permitting process, hired top legal and engineering experts, negotiated for safeguards, and have in place processes to monitor compliance.

The Board initially approved \$16,000 for attorneys and engineering experts. This month, they approved an additional \$3,500 to continue the process. TC attorneys will advise once they have analyzed the information provided by the specialists. News from the TCCSA Board of Directors Meeting

This report does not represent the official minutes of the meeting. Minutes are posted on the website and, once approved, are also in the office on Blue Valley Drive. At the **June 15, 2006** meeting these Directors were present: **Candy Goodrich, Brian Julian, Bill Kemp, Pam Losefsky, Robert May, John McCulloch, Russell Pinkston, and Janice Smith**. The Board took the following action or accepted the following reports:

- Directed Compliance Committee to make sure Book of Resolutions is complete and make it available on the website
- Agreed to monitor the use of greenbelts over the holiday to see if additional patrols by constables are needed
- Private Property sign at Sendero is on City property and will be moved to the trailhead near Hilltop pool
- Approved offer of Trail Runners group to clean up TCCSA properties in the area of trails in the Barton Creek greenbelt 2-3 times a year in exchange for entry through TCCSA property; they will limit the number of vehicles at trailheads and vehicles will display their decals to identify members; Board will review in September
- Approved private party for 150-200 guests
- Adjourned to executive session to discuss destruction of live oaks by resident in the TCCSA common greenbelt area behind his house
- Agreed to additional spending not to exceed \$3,500 to continue the contested case hearing on the wastewater treatment plant permit (see p.1)
- Adopted policy to protect TCCSA common areas from damage or destruction by an owner which includes a fine to be determined by the Board but which would not exceed \$1,000 per incident (see shaded box at right)

Postponed:

- Implementing restructuring of committees (see *TC Notes Dec. 2005 available on the TC website*)
- Consideration of committee budget requests

Board Passes Common Properties Damage Policy

As a result of recent events and in accordance with Section 9.02 of the TCCSA Declaration of Covenants, the Board has adopted a new policy to further protect our common areas. If any common area is damaged or destroyed by an owner or any of his guests, tenants, licensees, agents or members of his family, the Association may assess a fine not to exceed \$1,000 per incident. The amount will be set by the Board, and will be above the amount necessary for repairs. TCCSA may enforce collection of the fine consistent with previously adopted Declaration and policies.

The Declaration reads as follows:

Section 9.02. Damage or Destruction of Common Area by Owners. In the event any Common Area is damaged or destroyed by an Owner or any of his guests, tenants, licensees, agents or members of his family, such Owner does hereby authorize the Association to repair said damaged area, and the Association shall so repair said damaged area in a good workmanlike manner in conformance with the original plans and specifications of the area involved, or as the area may have been modified or altered subsequently by the Association, in the discretion of the Association. The amount necessary for such repairs shall be paid by said Owner, upon demand, to the Association and the Association may enforce collection of same in the same manner as provided elsewhere in this Declaration for collection and enforcement of assessments.

According to wildlife rehabilitation specialists, residents should NOT feed them bread. It does not digest well. Instead, residents can give them dry pet food. Please teach your children and dogs to treat them with respect. Be aware that the goose can be aggressive and might chase you in his territory.

New Rules to Address Crowding in Hilltop Beach Area

The capacity of the Hilltop beach area (the area closest to the pavilion) is 38. The area is very popular with families of small children. Lifeguards will be directing older children to the main pool when capacity has been reached. Signs will be posted. After consulting a certified arborist for a second opinion, the resident submitting the information is pleased to report that the trees do not have oak wilt. Message from Jim Rooni of the Texas Forest Service

(this is an edited email sent to Board Pres., Russell Pinkston)

I just want to inform everyone that there is a new oak wilt sheriff in town! Mr. Chris Dolan is the newly appointed oak wilt arborist with the City of Austin. Chris' job is to assist private landowners within the City of Austin with the identification and management of oak wilt. Chris can be contacted at 974-1881 or at chris.dolan@ci.austin.tx.us.

Some folks have inquired about some supplemental nutritional support for trees heavily afflicted with defoliating caterpillars. On large established live oaks, the answer is typically, no. This particular species of trees derives much of its nutrients from starches and sugars stored in a vast community root system. In worst case scenarios, various insect and environmental conditions in the hill country can result in numerous cycles of defoliation each growing season. Our native live oak species has proven to be probably the most robust in terms of having the spare energy reserves needed to re-set, or, re-foliate multiple times each season if needed without serious consequence.

However, if you do have an individual tree that seems to be ailing, and want to know what treatment options may be available, please contact a reputable ISA Certified Arborist to get more information about specific fertilizer treatments and associated costs.

Pool Incidents Report

This new monthly feature will be printed during the pool season and is submitted by the pool committee and Family Swim Gym, the company responsible for cleaning and managing the pools.

Blue Valley Pool:

Teenagers name-calling, harassing lifeguards.

Next day lifeguards whistle to clear pool due to thunder, same teens as night before refuse to exit pool, begin name-calling. FSG employee happens to arrive at pool and makes them leave. TC staff observes group burning rubber as they leave in black pickup.

Board member reports seeing resident at pool upset and saying that group of older boys was out of control. Resident had lifeguard call one of their parents.

Hilltop Pool:

On a Sunday evening, lifeguard observes vomit in beach area of pool. No one present claimed knowledge of incident. Parent and child responsible for this may have left pool area without reporting contamination. Lifeguards close, shock and clean pool due to contamination.

A 3 year old boy was just outside the beach area and began struggling and flailing, unable to swim to side of pool. Lifeguard rescue. One parent of child was watching from poolside, but not in swimwear, other parent was in water watching another child at the time.

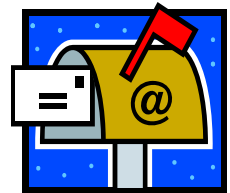

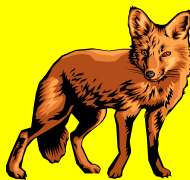

Coyote Update

According to Randy Farrar of the TX Cooperative Extension's Wildlife Services, the coyotes that have recently attacked and killed dogs and cats have been located. However, they are not on property that he has trapping access to. He expects that they will move their pups again and he will be following them.



He also reported that another coyote family killed a dog being walked in the greenbelt off MoPac. This area is heavily used by the public, yet this doesn't seem to faze the animals. Four calls regarding hearing or seeing coyotes have been made by residents in Travis Country since May 1.
